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The Life and Times of a Nursing Student

Jessica Barriga always knew she wanted to pursue nursing as a career, upon graduating South Salem High School she applied to Oregon State University and Linfield. Linfield denied her and Barriga was devastated, leaving her with her second choice OSU. Her godmother told her to then apply to CAMP, and so she did and she was a late acceptance, she was notified 3 days before the orientation began. Barriga remembers talking to Oscar on the phone saying he sounded intimidating like a "Mafioso".

"CAMP changed my life as corny as it may sound" said Barriga, her life shifted to then being surrounded by mostly Latino students and she had a blast her first week! She was exposed to different levels of acculturation and diversity from all the CAMP students in her cohort. While she was here she fell in love with OSU, and did not want to leave when the time came to go to nursing school.

She once again applied to Linfield and was told to wait two weeks to hear back on her acceptance. Two weeks went by, and nothing. Barriga gave it another week of waiting, and again, nothing. She finally picked up the phone to call admissions to inquire about the status of her application; she was thrilled to find out when she called that she had been accepted. The clock was ticking and she had a lot of papers to fill out in less than a week, "everything was so last minute in my life" says Barriga. While at Linfield she learned how important it is to be bilingual and culturally competent for all students wishing to pursue a career in health. Barriga graduated in May 2011 from Linfield with a 3.75 GPA, went abroad to India, and then it was time to take the NCLEX exam, although she had her Bachelor of Science in Nursing, passing the NCLEX is what would allow her to work as a nurse. Barriga trusted that her good grades demonstrating her knowledge in her classes would be enough to help her pass her exam, so she studied for two weeks for the NCLEX feeling sure that she would pass. She took the exam, and failed. Barriga explains how she had taken difficult exams before but the NCLEX was "absolute torture". For a year after that, she tried to study but was very scarred after the first attempt, so she focused elsewhere and worked for a non-profit and school district but nothing nursing related.

While talking to some colleagues one day, Barriga found out they had all failed the NCLEX exam on their first attempt and passed on their second try. Her friend's recommended her books to study, and from there Barriga gave it a second try and as her friends had expected, she

passed. Now it was time to find a job! She explains this as her "next turtle to overcome"; while she was still working she was looking for a nursing job and applied to about 15 different positions in and out of state. She explains that during her process she learned that "it's more about the people you know, rather than your credentials" about 90% of her interviews were because she dropped a name. Her interviews were brutal she explains, one time she interviews were brutal she explains, one time she interviewed felt she had it and did amazing, and she did not get the job. She then had a Skype interview for a job in Alaska, felt she did horrible, and got the job! She then adds "sometimes you think you do well and you don't, and vice-versa"

She was getting ready to move to Alaska, signed papers to go up there officially accepting her job, started talking to the manager, etc. when during this time Salem Hospital called her wanting to interview her for a job she had applied to, she accepted the offer, interviewed and felt she did "ok". Time was passing and once again she was not getting a call back to hear if she had gotten the job or not with Salem. Barriga was proactive and called Salem Hospital they told her she would get a call back...she waited and finally got a call offering her the job! She was beyond excited she could be close to home and not have to move to Alaska anymore, with only a week left to start her job that she was already going to start in Alaska she had to call and respectfully decline because she had gotten a job close to home where she could still be with those she loved. Barriga says she now feels like her life is finally getting together, her final words of advice were "to all the students wanting to pursue nursing, it's tough but people can only say no so many times. Be proactive, and a long as you get things done that's more important than however long it takes you to get there."

The Sukuli Project's mission is to improve health through education, research, and community recovery in Sierra Leone, Africa. Caroline 'Sudy' Storm has worked many years to improve the health of Sierra Leonean Villagers by building latrines and water wells, which is vital to long-term sustainable health and development. This year, a team of three students and Anna with Sudy will be collecting research by photovoice.

The Photovoice method allows for the villagers to use cameras and to take pictures to represent their perspectives on their traditional medicines. This method is often used among marginalized people, and is intended to give insight into how they conceptualize their experiences and their world. The hope is to collect information on traditional medicine and demographics of the villagers, as well as build a primary school that will serve 10 villages. Anna has been helping sell African-waist beads, and 100% of the proceeds are going to fund construction, staffing, and supplies!

A Summer In D.C: National HEP/CAMP Association D.C. Internship


